What is the project?

I am working with host organisation Shelter SA to conduct a literature review on the current conditions of housing affordability, and the drivers and effects of unaffordability in SA and Australia. The scope of the literature includes policy, statistics, surveys and other peer-reviewed research.

Preliminary Findings

- Critical policy analysis, policy responses and policy itself dominate the literature reviewed to date.
- There is correlation between the small amount of literature on home ownership and mortgage assistance and low levels of funding for both.
- A shrinking focus on social housing issues is matched by a growing emphasis on the private rental system in both the literature and public funding priority.


Understanding the way that policy informs and is informed by the affordability literature is important. It will guide the review and eventually the recommendations that I aim to make.
